Reporting on the Vincent Surname DNA Project

There are, as of May 7, 2008, 13 surname Vincent's who have tested with FTDNA and have results posted. A 14th person has recently sent in for a test kit.

The site lists 7 distinct family groups. I was hoping to have enough information to make some general statements about groupings. I am still awaiting responses from individuals that will make the story interesting.

As with most volunteer jobs I was later than I expected contacting people and of those contacted I am wondering where he is as his contact information does not work.

Within the DNA field there are new tests being offered and they may prove relevant in the future. Other general happenings are that the various testing companies are trying to unify the way they report their information.

Our Vincent family grouping is looking very strong and the DNA results from four of our people reinforces the direct line to Charles Vincent of New York as our Family Book states. A fifth person may be of the same line or help us find the parents of mentioned Charles.

I had reported that our identity tag as a family was R1b1c9a and, must now, report the new label to be: R1b1b2g3.

I am still excited and discovering the excitement of DNA research as a supporting tool for genealogy. You may send any questions to me and I will try to find the answers.

Vincent Family Association Reunion and Picnic August 16, 2008

Let's think back to 1933. By our best accounting that was the year of the first Vincent Family Reunion for the family in the Hudson River Valley. In the following years, large numbers attended the Reunion in "The Cove" I know of family photos from the 1920's for my branch of the family near Cambridge, Illinois for the James Brebner Vincent branch. We have records of reunions being held by the Levi Vincent branch near Lorain County, Ohio as early as 1908. There are also newspaper accounts in Eastern Michigan of large reunions in the 1920's.

The family reunions as a social event appear to have started in the early part of the 20th century. By that time the migrating families that had migrated west had roots of three or four generations of families and it became a natural desire to get together, visit with distant family members and to reacquaint themselves with the events of the year. It is a testament to our desired to have family connections that we still invest in the time and energy to get together.

I can remember the wonder of it when I attended my first Vincent Family Reunion in the early 1970's in Cambridge, Illinois. To realize that I had scores of cousins unknown to me and wanting to hear the stories of my Vincent family is what launched my interest in family history and a desire to see it preserved.

We are now learning that in addition to family trees that we can build that bind us together there is a chemical makeup we have from the essential DNA that marks us as Vincent and Vincent descendants. The satisfaction that comes from when we get together for even brief moments in time must still tickle our makeup. They tend to be low-key events, yet I do feel a rejuvenation each year I participate. I wish I could attend the others across the country.

We are saddened to have received several notes on the passing of family members included on page 3. Additionally, Bob and Nicollette Booream passed along the obituary for Mrs. Eleanor White of Ghent who died on February 26, 2008. Although she was not a member of the Vincent family, she and her husband Dr. Algird F. White owned and cared for the house and property once owned by Ambrose Vincent in Ghent, NY that includes a cemetery plot with many of the early Vincents of Ambrose Vincent's branch.

Waterford (CT) Ann Vincent Lee, age 76, of 8 Foot Court, died Friday (March 28, 2008) at the Lawrence and Memorial Hospital in New London.

She was born in New Haven, August 29, 1931, the daughter of George H. and Esther (Bradley) Vincent. She married Lt. Col. William W. Lee, Jr. (retired United States Army) in St. Rose Church in Meriden on October 20, 1956. He survives.

Mrs. Lee was a graduate of St. Margaret School in Waterbury, and graduated from Colby College in New London, New Hampshire in 1955. She had been employed as a medical technician for Abington General Hospital



in Philadelphia, PA; as well as at Meriden Hospital. She was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution as a descendent of patriot Samuel Atwater who was a drummer in the American Revolution. She was a direct descendent of William Bradley, an early founder of the New Haven Colony in 1638.

After her husband's retirement from a career in the United States Army in 1974, her family moved back to Waterford, after agreeing they would never move again-after moving 19 times in 20 years.

Mrs. Lee and her family also summered in Westbrook, and were members of the Grove Beach Point Association. Ann loved spending the summers at the beach surrounded by her children and grandchildren, especially celebrating the Fourth of July with a big family cookout. Ann also loved all holiday, as they were special times to spend with her family which she cherished.

She is survived by three sons, William W. "Chip" Lee, III and his wife Margaret of Westerly; Steven V. Lee and his wife Alice of Clinton; Peter B. Powder Keg by Barbara Knickerbocker

Just as we were getting ready to finalize this edition of *The Vincent Tin Horn*, I received a call from cousin Barbara Knickerbocker Beskind (VF#3264). In past issues we have mentioned a book she has been working on. Her dedicated efforts to publish the book are admirable; revised with a few changes, the new title is *Powder Keg*, with a new author name Barbara Knickerbocker and publisher BKB Press, of New London, NH. Another book is in the works with her publishing company. From the book jacket:

Throughout her childhood, Knickerbocker was force-fed family history. As an adult, the subject grew on her, compelling her to research and detail her family's origins from the Reformation of the 1500s to the founding of New York City, and the origins of the famous Knickerbocker name.

Here is her story – her childhood, her career and what led her to research her family history, then what she found – surprising connections between her Dutch and Walloon ancestors, and transplanted Sephardic Jews of the New World.

Knickerbocker is an American name. There are no Knickerbockers in The Netherlands. There never were. This famous American family name began as a tongue-in-cheek signature based on an age-old Dutch game.

The Vincent family were Belgic Walloons who fled their homeland at the time of the Reformation to escape religious persecution. Flax farmers, they brought their sought-after talents to the nascent settlement of New Amsterdam (now New York City).

Barbara Knickerbockers is a direct descent of both families. She grew up with her family history drummed into her by her elders. Raised during the Great Depression, she found her adult life profoundly influenced by her family's history.

While researching the Vincent family during the Reformation, she discovered fascinating historic parallels between the experiences of the Belgic Walloons and the Sephardic Jews both in Europe and more interestingly, in the early days of New Amsterdam.

Powder Keg is written in three parts. The first is a memoir of growing up during the Great Depression. She and her parents were crammed into the top floor of Grandma Knickerbocker's home.

Part II is a "museum" of Walloon and knickerbockers-Dutch historical artifacts. Part III is an early history of the two families and the founding of New York City.

Barbara Knickerbocker was raised near Hyde Park, New York, home of President Franklin Roosevelt, a connection that later touched upon her life work. She had a long and prominent career as an occupational therapist, often a pioneer in her field. It began with a 20 year Army career, retiring as a major, before setting up the first free-standing occupational therapy practice in the U.S. and treating learning-disabled children and adults in Princeton, New Jersey.

Steeped in family history from an early age, and as the last of her family line, she tells her life story and presents further research so that these long-standing family histories would not be lost to posterity.

Powder Keg will be available from the publisher the first week in June and available at bookstores or online booksellers. Or it can be ordered directly from Barbara at 103 Hilltop Place, New London, NH 03257 for \$17.
